

WC Mobile Market Expands to Grapevine

Since September of last year, the WC Mobile Market (WCMM) has brought fresh food and supplies to families in Haltom City, and now leaders are preparing to bring the program to Grapevine.

"God is working through this ministry to feed families with food insecurity," said church member and lead volunteer Mike Nelson. "In today's environment, with costs rising and programs diminishing, this ministry is [offering] direct assistance to our community."

The WC Mobile Market originally partnered with O.H. Stowe Elementary to help provide food to hungry students and families in the community. Since then, WC volunteers have continued

servicing those in Haltom City on the first Thursday of each month. At each event, clients are able to go through a drive-thru setup, where they stay in their cars throughout the food distribution process and receive boxes of food. Boxes may include a protein (like chicken or eggs), fresh produce, ready-to-eat products, and shelf-stable items to stock the pantry.

"They get in line, register with our registration team – giving some basic info such as the number of people in their family or how many family units they are picking up for," shared Jared



Smith, member of the WC Mobile Market Team. "Then they continue to drive through the line, down to the area [where] we have the trailer and tables set up. Volunteers have already spent about an hour prepping and packaging boxes of food from Tarrant Area Food Bank that are then carried over and placed into the clients' cars."

"Currently, we are providing about 40 lbs. of food for 175 families (or about 675 people) one week per month at O.H. Stowe in Haltom City," shared Nelson. "[The] response has been wonderful,

which only highlights the great need for this ministry."

Looking back at the last few months, WC Mobile Market dreamer and volunteer Lisa Barham explained how successful their efforts have been and how needs continue to develop.

"We've grown from serving 44 families our first month in September to serving 181 families," she shared. "We expect this number to keep growing each month as the word spreads... White's Chapel Methodist Church is making a huge impact on the families in this community. Our volunteers are truly angels on earth, and you can feel the love they share with these families. Most school-related supplemental food organizations stop

Passing the offering plate. "Our giving to God has a deeply spiritual component to it. We do not give to underwrite a budget; we give as a sign of our loyalty to God and our pledge to support the church with our prayers, presence, gifts, service and witness," said WC Co-pastor John McKellar. "For many people, the physical act of placing a gift in the offering plate during a worship service, allows them a particular connection in their relationship to God and their church."

McKellar added that the church leadership has been monitoring worship practices since COVID to determine when to bring it back. "Nationwide, returning to this spiritual practice is common. Additionally, we have had continual requests from our membership to do so. That is why we have decided to return to this traditional act of worship."

According to Robyn Olson, Worship Support Team Coordinator, volunteers to be ushers have always been needed, but this increases the immediate need for additional people to step up.

Ushers are needed for all of the services: Saturday at 5:30 p.m., and Sundays at 8:20, 9:30, and 11 a.m. Volunteers may choose the service they prefer.

"Nothing is complicated, and scheduling is VERY flexible to accommodate busy schedules," said Olson. "Each usher is trained for collecting the offering and to assist with communion flow. We only ask that you arrive 30-40 minutes prior to your service." Olson added that her own busy work and travel schedule led her to the usher team 25+ years ago. "It was a way for me to serve at WC when I wasn't available during the week, and I was able to do so with my spouse, Scott, as we volunteered together." Whether it's just you or you with a family member or friend please consider joining the Usher Team... and help us "pass the plate."

Cuba Medical Ministry Designated for May Communion Offering

God is at work in the Methodist Church in Cuba.

In 1993, Cuba had 80 Methodist Churches with 800 members. The Church has grown by approximately 10 percent each year since that time. By 2018, 476 Methodist churches existed, with over 50,000 members.

Many medical doctors in Cuba have come to Christ and joined the Methodist Church. Cuba has an abundance of MDs but lacks the basic meds, like vitamins, painkillers, and generic drugs, to treat

patients. The acute economic crisis that Cuba has experienced since the spread of COVID has multiplied the human suffering experienced since the communist revolution of 1959.

The Iglesia Metodista en Cuba organized a ministry to supply medicines to Christian doctors on the island in 2005. Headed by Dr. Aniran Ruiz Espinosa in Havana, the ministry distributes meds to doctors in Cuba that are connected to the church.

With that in mind, the White's Chapel communion offering for May will be designated for CUBA SANARA.

CUBA SANARA supports the Methodist Church of Cuba's Ministry

to Relieve Human Suffering. The Iglesia Metodista en Cuba (Methodist Church of Cuba) has more than 500 churches throughout the island as of 2021.

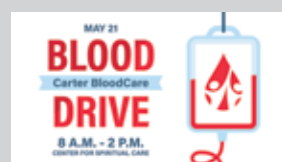
CUBA SANARA is a new ministry of St. Timothy on the Northshore out of New Orleans, LA. The ministry is solely dedicated to furnishing regular

during the summer; we will not. We will provide food for these families even when the school is closed in June and July. Our hearts are one with them and their need for food.”

She went on to give God the credit for the accomplishments they've made so far.

“God has led this program every step of the way, from our Outreach Committee who were brave enough to dream big, to having Mike Nelson answer God's call to take on this venture after reading an article in the newsletter to help orchestrate the entire program, to our congregation provide the funding,” Barham said. “As soon as we had our first opportunity to serve, we sent out a request to volunteers, we were shocked when 200+ volunteers wanted to sign up to help. God has His hand in every aspect of this program. Whenever we have needs, God provides those needs.”

Beginning May 11, the WC Mobile Market will offer a second monthly event to continue the fight against hunger. On the second Thursday of each month, WC volunteers will partner with the GRACE Community Outreach Center, part of GRACE – a nonprofit relief agency in Grapevine that provides food, clothing, and financial assistance to people on a limited income. The WC Mobile Market will set up on Mustang Drive, an area where food insecurity is prominent. A walk-up market will be available, giving people a chance to walk through the WC Mobile Market trailer and “shop” for themselves. This will be a new approach to the WC Mobile Market experience, and leaders believe it will benefit those in need of specific items.

“GRACE wanted to expand their long ministry of their Summer Grocery Giveaway to a more extensive program,” Nelson said. “WCMM will provide the food for these events obtained from Tarrant Area Food Bank. Customers will have a self-serve shopping experience to better customize their meal items.” Many WC Mobile Market volunteers keep coming back to serve because they see the impact they are making and understand how important hunger relief programs are to surrounding communities.

“These events feel like a very direct way of loving our neighbors and shining God's light, and a clear example of how hardship and struggle like food insecurity isn't only located far away, but just down



the street,”

Smith said.

“From the food bank truck to the clients' table, our volunteers have their hands in the work from start to finish. It's so much more than a faceless transaction for both parties. Our volunteers get to actually meet those they are serving, and our clients get to see the loving and caring faces of this ministry, they get to see a physical example the change our faith has on how we live our lives.”

“We are blessed in our community, and no one should go hungry on our watch,” said Barham.

Among Nelson, Smith and Barham, other WC Mobile Market Team members include Mark Mednansky (Food Distribution), Bev Chernoff (Registration Volunteers), Jim Niewald (Traffic and Volunteers), Rev. Sterling Smith (leader and huge supporter), and many others.

Additional volunteers are needed to assist in the new offering with GRACE and help with future events. Many different volunteer jobs are available to people of all ages (16 and above) and various abilities. There may be some heavy lifting, as volunteers help breakdown the pallets of food for customer distribution. People are also needed to help direct traffic and assist with registration. Spanish-speakers are also welcome! About 40-50 people are needed for each event. Those interested can sign up online (link available on the church website) or contact Jared Smith at jsmith@whiteschapel.org for more information.

“We would like to expand to additional locations, like GRACE in Grapevine over two weeks and perhaps near our ongoing ministries in [the] El Buen area,” Nelson said. “We also have emergency and remote capabilities with our WCMM refrigerated trailer to go and be God's hands.”

supplies of over the counter drugs and prescription meds to doctors in Cuba through the network established by the Iglesia Metodista en Cuba.

The ministry's goal is to order the meds requested by the Iglesia Metodista at discounted prices from Blessings International in Tulsa, Oklahoma. Packages are shipped monthly to a courier service in Florida which delivers the meds directly to the conference offices in Havana.

Conference offices in Havana have a secure storeroom where donations are warehoused until distributed by Dr. Ruiz. The supply of meds through mission teams is sporadic and unpredictable. CUBA SANARA will provide a regular supply to meet the chronic shortages of meds that Cuba faces.

Dr. Ed Bee, a member of St. Timothy Methodist Church in New Orleans, has been working diligently to assist in this medical ministry. Dr. Bee is an economist and economic development consultant, with a doctorate in International Development. He speaks Spanish and English, although not a native Spanish speaker. Born in Fort Worth, he lived for 5 years on the border in the Rio Grande Valley before moving to Louisiana. He currently operates a consulting practice where he advises communities on states of economic development strategies, and is helping the State of Louisiana update its International Commerce Master Plan. He also teaches economic development at the university level. He holds positions as adjunct professor of economics and finance at Murray State in Kentucky and in economic development and business at the University of Southern Mississippi. He has nearly 40 years of experience in economic development

"[This part of] the CUBA SANARA ministry was started at the beginning of 2023," said Bee. "The Mission Team at St. Timothy's approved my request in February this year. I proposed that we conduct a trial of two shipments before we started soliciting donations for the mission. The second trial arrives in Havana next [this] week. The first was delivered in early April, without any pilfering or shortages, which is due to God's grace!"

Bee says the ministry discovered the courier service being used last October. "We needed to find a way to get a generator for our mission project delivered to Havana.

Southwest airlines won't ship generators and we didn't want to be sitting idly in Havana for two weeks because of the frequent power shortages the island is facing. The courier is related to the pastor at one of the Methodist churches in Cuba who recommended them to us. The generator arrived safely at the bishop's office in Havana on schedule."

The entire Mission Team at St. Timothy is involved. Cuba has been a focus ministry for the church since 2017. Two other members of the congregation went with Bee to Havana last October. All three of these volunteers have had a role in forming CUBA SANARA once they saw the acute need to support the Methodist Church of Cuba's medicine ministry.

In addition to St. Timothy, Lea Theriot in Baton Rouge, "a dear Christian Sister," places the orders for the ministry with Blessings International. Theriot is a pediatric dietician and works at one of

the largest hospitals in LA. She has been a member of Cuba mission teams since the late 1990s.

Bee first went to Cuba as a member of the LA VIM Team in 2011. He felt called to return in 2017 and 2018 and 2022. Missions in 2020 and 2021 were cancelled due to COVID.

"On each of these missions we took medicines with us, normally 1-2 bags, which we gave to Dr. Aniran Ruiz Espinosa, the MD that heads the church's medicine ministry," said Bee. "Mission teams from other states have done the same thing for the last decade. These supplies, plus a few mailed packages from England, were the only sources of medicines to support the church's medicine ministry."

"While in Havana, God put on my heart the need to find a steady supply of meds to help our brothers and sisters in Cuba. Dr. Ruiz met me at the Methodist Center one night at 9:00 to talk about the chronic need for medicines. In the current financial crisis, clinics don't even have aspirin or ibuprofen to give to those with fever or pain. Things we take for granted like children's vitamins can't even be purchased there. Ruiz's visit, after an hour trip on the bus after a long day at the clinic, touched my heart and motivated me to see if we couldn't use the resources at St. Timothy to make the

supply of meds predictable and more abundant."

Bee knew that OTC and generic meds could be bought at wholesale prices from Blessings International in Tulsa. "We believed we could rely on the courier service that had delivered our generator to Cuba to deliver the meds," he explained. "We also knew that the Government of Cuba is allowing shipments of medicines to enter the country duty free if brought in as 'accompanied luggage' (baggage carried by a courier qualifies). When I returned I checked with the US Department of State to make sure we were not violating the US trade embargo with Cuba. When they sent me email confirmation that our shipments would qualify for the status of 'Humanitarian Exemptions' I knew we were ready to do some trial shipments to put the idea to a real world test."

ministry has a goal to do a monthly shipment of meds to Cuba. Currently shipments are sent only as the funds become available. Each shipment costs about \$1,500. There are no overhead expenses or salaries in CUBA SANARA. Every dollar donated goes into purchase and shipment of medicines.

"Many Methodists from the United States equate what is happening in Cuba

to the Apostolic age," said Bee. "Folks are coming to Christ all over the island. After 60 years of the failed promise that a Communist utopia is just around the corner, Cubans are looking for answers and finding them in the fellowships of the Methodist Church as well as the other evangelistic churches in Cuba (Baptist and Pentecostal primarily). The 500 churches are supported by what I would estimate are several thousand house churches that meet during the week. God is moving in a dramatic way in Cuba. I would invite members of your church to join me in the future missions to see for themselves how the church can thrive in the midst of government persecution and poverty."

As always, 100 percent of the offerings collected for communion at White's Chapel go to the designated recipient. The congregation's generous support is greatly appreciated.
